SOUTH CAROLINA NONFARM EMPLOYMENT TRENDS FOR OCTOBER — SEASONALLY Adjusted

The Current Employment Survey of businesses in South Carolina marked an increase of 6,700 nonfarm payroll jobs over the month to a level of 2,157,500.

- Industries that reported gains were in the Manufacturing (+4,200); Professional and Business (+2,000); Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+1,500); Other Services (+800); Financial Activities (+500); Education and Health Services (+200); and Information (+100) industry.
- Decreases were observed in the Construction (-1,900); Government (-600); and Leisure and Hospitality (-100) industry.
- Retail trade had an increase of (+1,900).

From October 2020 to October 2021, South Carolina's economy has picked up 65,500 seasonally adjusted, nonfarm jobs.

- Industries with strong growth was reported in the Trade, Transportation, and Utilities (+19,600); Leisure and Hospitality (+17,600); Manufacturing (+7,400); Education and Health Services (+6,300); Construction (+5,100); Other Services (+5,000); Government (+4,000); Professional and Business Services (+1,100); and Information (+700) industry.
- There was a decline noticed in the Financial Activities (-1,400) industry.
- Retail Trade increased (+13,100) over the period.

For the Metropolitan Statistical Areas, seasonally adjusted, total nonfarm payroll job increases were seen in Columbia (+2,100); Greenville, (+2,100); Charleston (+1,400); Myrtle Beach (+1,000); Spartanburg (+400); Hilton Head (+200); and Florence (+100). Decreases were seen in Sumter (-300).

Over the year, seven of the Metropolitan Statistical Areas saw an increase in seasonally adjusted payroll. Leading with employment gains were Charleston (+14,000); Greenville (+12,500); Columbia (+8,600); Myrtle Beach (+5,900); Spartanburg (+5,600); Hilton Head (+3,100); Florence (+800); and Sumter declined by (-100).



S.C. GROSS DOMESTIC PRODUCT




